The League was instrumental in passage of the National Voter Registration Act (NVRA) and its provisions against voter purges. Having an additional canvass besides the annual canvass for purposes of voter list is costly and unnecessary and increases the likelihood of unwarranted removal of voters from the roles. Voters should not be punished with removal from the rolls for not voting or not properly engaging with their ROV. The postal mail notification process that sufficed when the NVRA was past needs updating to reflect that postal mail is not an effective means of confirming residential addresses of mobile populationsespecially with Louisiana's many weather disasters and particularly when change of address frequent trigger triggers voter

				combat corruption and undue influence in government. These can include reasonable restrictions on campaign fundraising and contributions. The League has concerns about money in politics in Louisiana and considers the ban on campaign fundraising during the regular session to be a reasonable limit that allows legislators to avoid appearances of influence and corruption and to focus on the work that they have been elected to do.

At the federal level, the League has been working to combat deceptive campaign contributions in conjunction with League positions on positions on a citizen's right to know, citizen participation, and campaign finance. The League believes that voters deserve access to true and complete information about elections and the candidates seeking their votes. The League is particularly concerned by efforts to undermine the role of voters and corrupt the election process by attempting to deceitfully sway voters' opinions or suppress voter turnout through misinformation about election rules. The League supports preservation of the integrity of our electoral process

				by increasing transparency in our elections. The League seeks to ensure voters have the necessary resources to make informed voting decisions.

The legislature should not enact a blanket prohibition on a form of voting that has been used successfully in some jurisdictions, absent opportunities for education and advocacy so that voters can consider the issue. Some say that ranked- choice voting with Louisiana's jungle primary could be the gold standard of voting and would also reduce the number of costly elections that we have in Louisiana. Louisianans should have the opportunity to consider implementation of this voting method.
				While LWVUS has taken no position on RCV nationally or at the federal level, it encourages interested state and local chapters to inform their advocacy around its position on Voter Representation/Electoral systems. Overall, the League promotes an open governmental system that is representative, accountable, and responsive. We encourage electoral methods that provide the broadest voter representation possible and are expressive of voter choices. The League supports enabling legislation to allow local jurisdictions to explore alternative electoral methods, as well as supporting state election laws allowing for more options at both the state and local levels.

The League supports restoration of voting rights to voters with felony convictions who have met the specified criteria to support rehabilitation, reduce recidivism, and ensure successful reentry of offenders

People who file the registration forms may be volunteers for organizations that are not empowered or equipped to verify a registrant's citizenship. This bill appears intended to punish voter education volunteers and others for false statements by others with onerous fines and penalties. It is a xenophobic bill that risks suppressing voter registration work and valid registration of citizens entitled to vote.

The League supports policies and procedures that support and improve polling place management. Concerns are that poll watchers could create safety and privacy concerns for election workers and voters and otherwise impede the orderly operation of elections. Additional personnel in polling places can create confusion for voters or facilitate voter intimidation.
